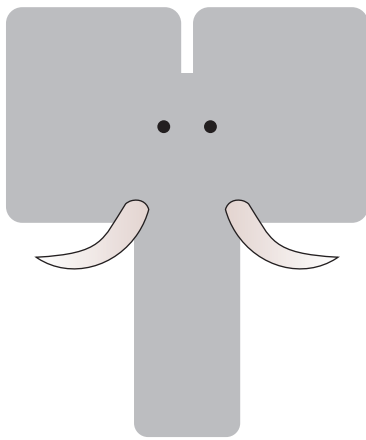


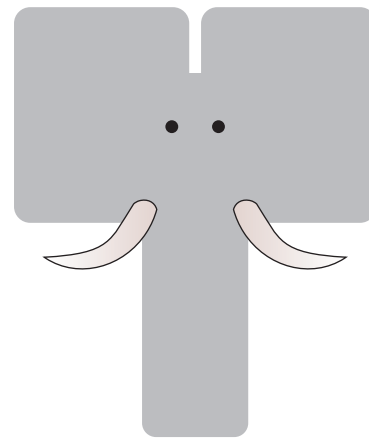
Chapter 16: Bun Eating Pests

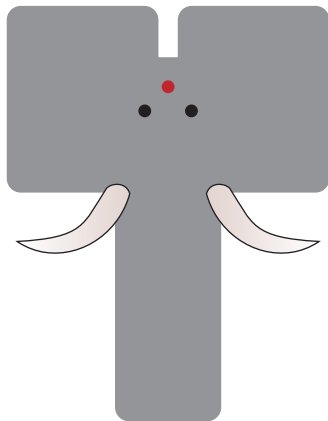

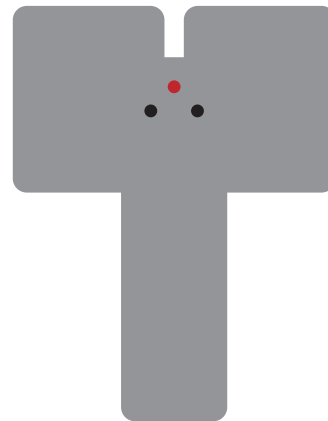
*MALE AFRICAN
